Field Research Grants Available From CFR

The Center for Field Research, a non-profit organization established to raise private funding for field research scientists and to encourage public understanding of science, is currently accepting proposals for 1979. The Center and its affiliate, EARTHWATCH, have raised over one million dollars to support worthy research. In 1978, it will channel another \$500,000 into grants. Eligible disciplines include, but are not limited to, anthropology, archaeology, astronomy, biology, botany, cartography, conservation, ethology, folklore, geography, geology, marine sciences, medicine, meteorology, musicology, ornithology, restoration and sociology.

October 1, 1978, is the proposal deadline for projects beginning after June 1, 1979. IAQR Requests References For Tephrachronology Bibl.

The International Association for Quaternary Research is planning to publish a supplement to the World bibliography and index of Quaternary tephrochronology in 1980. The subject matter of the supplement and future editions of the bibliography is being broadened to tephra rather than being limited to tephrochronology. Gulf Pub. Co., CCI Publish Energy Volumes

Gulf Publishing Company has issued volume one of Energy bibliography and index, a guide to 20,000 books, maps, government documents, and technical reports in the field of energy. Entries are indexed under five categories and abstracts of 50-100 words are included under main entries. The projected series will contain five volumes and quarterly updates will be issued. The energy sourcebook has been published by the Center for Compliance Information of Aspen Systems Corporation. This 667-page compendium covers fifteen sources of energy: resources and potential sources. consumption, outlook, legislation, technology, economics, conservation, and guidelines for industry. Univ. Of Alaska Museum Releases Mining Bibliography

The University of Alaska Museum has released a 463-paged document entitled *Alaska mining history*, by Virginia Doyle Heiner. It is number 17 in the Museum's *History and archaeology* series. It is primarily an Alaskan mining bibliography arranged by mining areas of the state. A brief section at the end of the publication lists other sources of information (by author and year) on such subjects as mining law, mineral resources, etc. The book is available for \$6.50, plus 75 cents for postage and handling, from the University of Alaska Museum, Fairbanks 99701.

As your new President, I have been kept busy writing dozens (hundreds?) of letters and other responses to various concerns of the Society. The most unexpected things often require some kind of response from the Society and it often falls to the President to make the appropriate responses, be it a letter from Peking, China, requesting sample issues of our publications and information about the Society, or making certain the communication channels between our Society and other societies stay open, or the exchange of ideas both within and without the geologic communities. I have been pleased with the cooperation of all members of the Society and their willingness to serve in whatever capacity the Society neds at the moment. This is not to suggest I expected anything less.

I plan to give a short Presidential address at the GIS Luncheon during the Toronto '78 Meeting, but there are a few items that I should like to call to your attention before that time. First, there are a couple of Technical Programs at the Toronto '78 Meeting of interest to many of our members, in addition to the GIS program by our Program Director and President-elect, Julie Bichteler: Geoscience Publication—Problems and Prospects.'' The two are "Remote Sensing" by Murray Felsher and "Geological Information—Problems in Transfer from Scientist to Policy Maker."

And speaking of the Toronto Meeting, permit me to say that I would welcome any suggestions for matters to be considered for discussion at the business meeting. I should like as much input as possible. Please write directly to me.

The 1978 *Proceedings*, Vol. 8, for the 1977 Seattle Meeting have all been distributed. If you did not get your copy, let me know and I shall try to find out why and see to it that you get one.

Plans are proceeding with the Geological Information Conference Organizing Committee to make the next International meeting (Paris 1980?) even better than the recent London meeting. I shall continue to serve on that Committee and should like any input you might have. We can certainly discuss it at the Toronto Meeting.

Two GISers have been appointed to serve on the National Advisory Board on GeoRef of the AGI. They are Arleen Somerville of the Science Library, University of Rochester, and Dederick Ward, Geology Librarian, University of Colorado. Although they are not serving as official representatives of GIS, the Society is well represented by these two very interested and knowledgeable persons. Dedy is a Past President of GIS and Arleen ran for Vice-President at the Miami meeting. I continue to serve as the official GIS representative on the GeoRef Board and its chairman.

I attended the meeting of the Associated Society Presidents and the GSA Executive Committee on February 2, 1978 at GSA Headquarters, Boulder. A few things of interest are: (1) The abolition of the \$20 abstract fee for symposium and technical program papers at the Annual GSA meetings, (2) Abstract with Program format change: it is no longer to be a "handbook" size but $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$, and (3) The San Diego, California Meeting will run $3\frac{1}{2}$ days, November 5-8, 1979.

Robert Bier, Treasurer, served as GIS representative (in Dick Walker's place) at the AGI Governing Board Meeting, April 13, 1978, at the Hotel Skirvin in Oklahoma City.

Marie Siegrist of Washington, D. C., has agreed to serve as our official contact person for incorporating purposes (we need someone with an address in the district where we are incorporated).

Hart Phinney, Colorado School of Mines, has agreed to serve as our first "Historian" for a two year trial period. Harriet Wallace, University of Illinois, did not feel she could accept this important appointment at this time. Please contact Hart if you have any information you feel deals directly or indirectly with the Society and should be preserved for future use as an archival record of our past.
