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AGI Publishes New Edition Of Glossary Of Geology

The American Geological Institute has just published the second edition of the Glossary of geology. The new edition of this major dictionary of the earth sciences contains "36,000 terms, compared to 33,000 in the 1972 edition, and reflects changes in the geoscience vocabulary of the last decade. Changes are particularly evident in such active fields as biostratigraphy, remote sensing, plate tectonics, cave and karst, igneous petrology, paleomagnetism, remote sensing, plate tectonics, and seismic stratigraphy. 450 new mineral names, more than one hundred abbreviations, and nearly 500 new references to the literature have been added to the publication." The compilers are Robert L. Bates, Professor Emeritus of Geology, The Ohio State University, and Julia A. Jackson of the American Geological Institute. MARC Maps Processing Topic Of LC Workshop

The Geography and Map Division of the Library of Congress is sponsoring and conducting a two-part MARC Maps Processing Workshop in LC's James Madison Memorial Building June 16-20, 1980. (The week following the Special Libraries Association annual conference in Washington, D.C.) The workshop is being coordinated by David K. Carrington, Head, Technical Services Section. Among the featured speakers is GIS member John R. Schroeder, Head, Cataloging Unit. The two-day lecture series (June 16-17) "is intended to provide a general orientation on the use and application of the MARC Maps format for the processing of cartographic materials in the Geography and Map Division of the Library of Congress, and to examine MARCS Maps, particularly as to its impact on and value in on-line cooperative cataloging of cartographic materials. The session should be of interest to map librarians, cartographic archivists, library administrators, network coordinators, and catalogers of other formats. This session will be open to a maximum of 100 registrants." The 2-1/2 day practicum (June 18-20) "is intended to provide a relatively inexpensive, practical orientation to LC and Geography and Map Division practices and procedures for MARC Maps data preparation and cartographic material cataloging. This session of the workshop should be of particular interest to catalogers and map librarians who are inputting map records into utilities such as OCLC or RLIN, or who are

planning to do so." There is no charge for the workshop. Participants will be accepted on a first come, first served basis. ISI Expands Program For Library Grants

The Institute for Scientific Information, Philadelphia, has announced that its program of awarding grants towards the purchase of many of ISI's information services has been expanded. Grant rates as low as 25% of list price have been set up, and new products have been made available through the program. The Library Grant Program in 1980 is a new category which will enable certain libraries to obtain ISI indexes at 25% of list price. These libraries can be at schools such as junior colleges, community colleges and technical schools which do not grant Bachelors, Masters, or Doctoral degrees, although they may award certificates of achievement for academic credit. Other libraries, depending on their type and sizes, can qualify for grant awards allowing the purchase of ISI's major indexes at 75% or 50% of list price. Among the indexes available through the Library Grant Program is the Science citation index® (SCI®), a major multidisciplinary index to the literature of the sciences. Acquisition of the SCI can give libraries coverage of over 3,000 life and physical science journals and nearly 1,200 books annually.

The SCI is a totally integrated literature search system. It employs a variety of indexing techniques including title-word, author, organization, and citation indexing. Citation indexing is based on the fact that an author's references (citations) to previously published material indicate subject relationships between the current author's article and the older publications. In a citation index, these relationships can be used to retrieve new items about a subject when an earlier work on the same subject is known by the literature searcher.

Librarians, scientists, researchers and other professionals are invited to apply for a determination of grant eligibility for their organizations or departments. ISI's Library Grant Program is directed by Arthur Kennedy, Grant Coordinator. National Sea Grant Depository Issues 1979 Publications Index

The 1979 edition of the Sea Grant publications index is available to libraries free of charge. The Index contains citations from all publications generated by the National Sea Grant Program for 1979. It consists of six cross-referenced sections: document listing, key word in context index, author index, corporate index, NTIS number index, and additional report number index (a listing of numbers assigned to Sea Grant publications by the issuing institutions). Among the marine science disciplines covered are aquaculture, fisheries, mineral resources, biomedicinals, ocean engineering, coastal management, pollution studies, marine education, and applied oceanography. The Sea Grant publications index is produced by computerized retrieval from the National Sea Grant Depository's bibliographic data base, which contains some 13,000 citations dating from 1968. The cumulative data base is available on microfiche. All publications cited in the Index are available on loan for a period of one month. Inforonics Offers Libraries Total Cataloging Service

Inforonics, Inc., Littleton, Mass., announces the availability of professional cataloging services to complement its catalog data base maintenance system. This improvement allows Inforonics to provide a total cataloging service for special libraries. It is tailored to suit individual library requirements and solve customer problems of on-line MARC II data base searching, searching of NUC and other data bases for catalog data not on MARC, original cataloging, entering holdings data, and updating shelflists. The special services provided range from a total on-going catalog maintenance service, where acquisition slips and shelflist changes are forwarded to Inforonics, to provision of only original cataloging and data entry for those titles not found by the customer in the Inforonics' on-line data base. The specific products produced by Inforonics' library automation system are book catalogs and shelflists, computer typeset accessions lists, COM catalogs, cards, labels, magnetic tapes and union catalogs.
