Call For Papers GIS Annual Meeting New Orleans, 1982

The Geoscience Information Society plans to hold a half-day symposium and a half-day contributed papers session at the Geological Society of America's Annual Meeting in New Orleans October 18-21, 1982. The symposium is entitled "Geologic Hazards Data," a topic which we feel is timely and of interest to a number of conference attendees. The symposium will consist of five thirty-minute presentations by individuals actively involved in the collection, storage and retrieval of geologic hazards data. They have been invited to discuss bibliographic and numerical data files, maps, and other sources of information.

Contributed Papers Session

GIS members and other interested individuals are encouraged to participate in this important part of the Annual Meeting. Papers should be 15 minutes in length and may concern any topic relevant to the field of geoscience information: current research projects, design and/or use of data bases, publishing, indexing, collection development, special collections, bibliographic instruction, user surveys, etc.

Abstracts for the papers should not exceed 250 words in length. They must be received at GSA, Boulder, by Friday, May 21. Appalachian Gold Sites Detailed In Topo Maps

There's gold in them thar hills and Charles Overbey wants to help you find it. Overbey, an engineer and retired NASA executive, has researched geological records and has authored a series of detailed maps showing 1,000 sites where gold has been found in the Appalachian states, from Georgia to northwest of Washington, D.C. The large-scale maps give gold history and facts and are done on U.S.G.S. topographic bases in three colors on both sides of the sheet. Maps showing 300 gold sites in North Carolina, 200 sites in Virginia and 500 sites in Georgia are now available. Color Videopetrography Available In Cassettes

Color videopetrography, by Frederick Nagle, Dept. of Geology, University of Miami, Coral Gables, consists of thin section mineralogy and petrology videocassettes designed for undergraduate and graduate instruction in optical mineralogy and petrology. They are available in two packages of three programs and six programs, each 11 to 25 minutes in length. Package 1, Minerals in thin section, may be purchased for \$95.00; package 2, Rocks in thin section, \$195.00. A number of GIS members have been appointed to AGI advisory committees. The 1982 Publications Advisory Committee has APHRODITE MAMOULIDES as one of its members. BARBARA MACDONALD, DONALD B. MCINTYRE, and CLARENCE STURDIVANT have been named to the GeoRef Advisory Committee.

JOHN MULVIHILL, Director, GeoRef Information Systems, reports that 64,735 references were added to GeoRef in 1981. This is a 16% increase in production over 1980.

GeoRef is no longer including in its data base abstracts of papers presented at meetings of the Geological Society of America, American Association of Petroleum Geologists, and American Geophysical Union. It still cites those of local science academies. The volume of papers is such that it is a time-consuming operation and there is often repetition of the same abstract in various publications. Ghassan Rassam, Chief Editor, GeoRef, would like to hear from those who feel strongly that these abstracts should appear in GeoRef.
